LOS ANGELES WILD FIRE

A new wildfire, the Hughes Fire, erupted on Wednesday morning, January 7 in the rugged mountains north of Los Angeles. Since then, these series of destructive wildfires have affected the Los Angeles metropolitan areas and surrounding regions. These have been spreading through dry vegetation resulting in the pemissions of thick plumes of smoke into the sky.

Cal Fire had reported on Monday morning that over 10,000 structures were destroyed or damaged during the Eaton Fire, and in the Palisades Fire 6,051 structures were destroyed and 788 structures were damaged. Not only has the destruction and damage of the property taken place but also as of January 23, 2025, the LA wildfires have caused at least 27 deaths and numerous injuries, with ongoing assessments for additional casualties.

Firefighters in Los Angeles have been risking their lives battling intense flames, smoke, and extreme heat to rescue residents, protect communities, and fight the devastating wildfires with unwavering courage and dedication. These firefighters have battened down wildfires in Los Angeles with more than 50,000 under evacuation orders and warnings. The Los Angeles fire rather wildfire has ravaged several parts of the US city but the authorities are still only partially aware of the causes leading to this disaster. However, experts have noted the extreme weather that created more favorable conditions: heavy rains that drove vegetation growth, then extreme drought that turned much of that vegetation into good fire fuel.

The Los Angeles wildfires of January 2025 highlight the need for improved wildfire management and climate adaptation strategies. As the region faces increasing fire risks, collaboration, and sustainable practices are crucial for reducing future disasters, while the bravery of firefighters and residents shows the strength to rebuild and adapt.

THE UNIFORM CIVIL CODE(UCC) IN INDIA: A PATH TO EQUALITY OR A CHALLENGE TO DIVERSITY?

In a country as diverse as India, where every community has its own festivals, food, and even unique ways of arguing over cricket, the idea of a Uniform Civil Code (UCC) seems improbable. Yet, here we are, debating whether a single law can magically solve centuries of cultural and religious differences.



Controversies surrounding UCC

The Uniform Civil Code (UCC) has been a subject of intense debate in India for decades. Rooted in Article 44 of the Indian Constitution, the UCC seeks to replace personal laws based on religious customs with a single, unified legal framework governing marriage, divorce, inheritance, adoption, and maintenance for all citizens, regardless of religion. Supporters call it a revolutionary step toward gender equality and national integration. For instance, India ranks 127th out of 146 countries in the Global Gender Gap Report 2023; advocates argue that a UCC could address this disparity by eliminating discriminatory practices like triple talaq or equal inheritance rights for women.

However, critics see the UCC as less of a unifier and more of a steamroller, flattening India's rich diversity. With 79.8% of Indians identifying as Hindu, many worry that the UCC might reflect majority practices, sidelining minority rights. Additionally, India's literacy rate hovers around 77%, raising questions about whether people fully understand or trust the implications of a uniform law. While states like Uttarakhand have taken steps toward UCC, the central government remains cautious, likely to avoid alienating key voter bases before elections.

So, will the UCC be India's big step toward equality or just another topic for heated debates at chai stalls? One thing is certain: if implemented, it'll be the only thing uniting Indians—for once, everyone will find something to complain about. After all, if we can't agree on how spicy biryani should be, how can we expect everyone to agree on a single law for 1.4 billion people?

Elon Musk, the prolific entrepreneur behind SpaceX, Tesla, and other ventures, has extended his influence beyond the confines of technology and business into the realm of politics. Musk's quest for global dominance has sparked widespread discussion and controversy. Once seen as a key ally of Donald Trump during the U.S. elections, Musk has now ventured into international politics, leveraging his platform X (formerly Twitter) to shape narratives and stir debates worldwide.

In December, the German government accused Musk of meddling in the country's politics after he authored an op-ed endorsing the Alternative für Deutschland (AfD), a party known for its staunch anti-immigration stance. Paradoxically, Musk has historically been an advocate for immigration reform, as evidenced by his support for H-1B visa policies in the United States. Deputy Chancellor Robert Habeck labeled Musk's actions a "frontal attack on our democracy." Adding to the controversy, the AfD has been linked to troubling meetings with German and Austrian leaders associated with neo-Nazi movements to discuss plans for mass deportations if the party gains more power. This association has led German intelligence agencies to monitor AfD members closely.

Amidst these events, Musk faced further criticism during a public appearance when a gesture he made was interpreted by some as a Nazi salute. While the context of the gesture remains ambiguous, it has intensified debates about his public image and the potential societal impact of his actions.

However, Musk's influence extends beyond controversy. In January 2025, he reportedly played a key role in facilitating the release of Italian journalist Cecilia Sala from an Iranian prison. This intervention highlighted his capacity to engage in international diplomatic negotiations, bypassing traditional government channels. Musk's actions challenge established diplomatic norms while exposing gaps in global governance. His involvement raises fundamental questions: Should unelected billionaires wield such influence over global policies? Or does Musk's growing role in international affairs symbolize a democratization of power, disrupting outdated systems?





When 30 liters of water are taken out of it, it is one-sixth full. What is the capacity of the cistern? I got good scores, but still it was terrible. I believe the crazy interest sparked when I reached 7th grade and was introduced to the good bits of Euclidean Geometry. This was something I could understand I could play around with it as much as I liked all the resource I ever needed was a pen and a notebook (or an old newspaper or even a napkin) and even if I had nothing, I still could think about it in my head. For the first time I was way ahead of my peers and even my teachers at school who used to ask me for tips when they were stuck on a geometry problem.

Later, when I was in 10th grade, I started on physics and read about the Special Theory of Relativity from the Feynman lectures on Physics. That seemed to me the most beautiful thing ever. I realized that I could get only so far in physics without the math and so I started up on calculus. It took me a good long time to understand the Weierstrass definition of limits, but when I did, it became my new best thing ever. I read the basics of differentiation and by the time I had completed 10th grade, I had derived by myself the formulas for the volumes and areas of pyramids, cones and spheres. The thing I like about math is that it is independent of what is going on in your life. No matter what happens your dog has died, you flunked a test, solving a problem or understanding something you thought you couldn't immediately cheers you up.

Now that I have had the privilege of working as a Math educator across different educational systems, including IB, CBSE, and JEE Mathematics, I feel fortunate to have been part of institutions where I could contribute to students' academic growth, and I take great satisfaction in seeing them succeed. In this journey, I have come to know the most important factor in creating an effective learning environment is the strong bond between students and their teacher, built on trust and mutual respect. When students trust their teacher, they feel safe to express their thoughts, ask questions, and make mistakes without fear of judgment. 

This was not the first record she had stumbled upon, mostly put forward by those who could not quite comprehend the ideals of feminism. For Meera, the issue was not about finger-pointing and who was to blame-it was about creating a world of even ground where both perhaps her son and others might live.

Feminism is critical for the women's community, and it is in fact extremely beneficial for society. Empowerment of women will give birth to stronger economies and better communities. As an example, it was supported by McKinsey & Company that if gender gaps were closed, we would be able to add \$28 trillion to the global gross domestic product by 2025. One in every three women is destined to suffer physical or sexual violence at least once in her lifetime. These figures are only a heartbeat away from saying that all human societies are complicit in nurturing violence and mental problems among its members. This is the issue that feminism seeks to address: the urgency of social justice, which demands laws of good governance, social supports that give survivors courage to face the harsh world behind them, and a social change that strengthens respect.

Meera had this daydream while observing her son play. She was seeing him growing up in a world having no limitations due to the outdated gender expectations-a period and space where everybody could grow without the threat of violence, and discrimination. And it is not only Meera but also a majority of other women to feel that feminism holds their hope for a safer, fairer world.

Imagine a student in his drop year, shedding blood, sweat, and tears for his last attempt at JEE. Now imagine the same situation in more than 10 lakh households in India. This 'Har Ghar Ki Kahani' example is not only restricted to the Joint Entrance examination but various other competitive exams that dictate the lives of middle-class households.

The Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) and the National Eligibility cum Entrance Test (NEET) are among the most competitive entrance examinations in India, serving as critical gateways for the world of engineering and medicine. Despite their significance, both examinations present a range of inherent drawbacks that merit rigorous scrutiny. Primarily, The relentless pressure to excel in exams like JEE and NEET drives students to the brink.

The lure of the IITs is real because it is believed that IIT graduates do not have to worry about their future. However, 38 percent of IITians with their hands yet open for job placements, have found new passions to tread on in life. The situation has become so grave that even the prestigious IIT Delhi has contacted its alumni for assistance in placing the current batch or recommending graduates to firms seeking engineers.

Lastly, such examinations in India often focus on subject-specific knowledge, neglecting essential skills like creativity, leadership, and communication. This narrow focus leaves out students with potential in areas not tested by the exams, limiting their opportunities for further studies. The high-stakes nature of these exams, particularly JEE, has led to high dropout rates and suicide rates. In Kota, India, six students died by suicide in the first four months of 2021, the highest since the city's establishment three decades ago.

Hence this leaves one wondering, does a seat at India's epitome of academic prestige require high rates of anxiety, depression, and burnout?
